

Webinar Episode 2:

Strengthening Community Collaboration to Support Literacy and Student Success

Purpose: To showcase how RISE Augusta and local partners collaborate to improve literacy outcomes across Georgia communities.

Key Discussion Highlights

1. Opening Context

- Scott Johnson (Chairman) and Malcolm Mitchell introduce the series and celebrate RISE Augusta as a 2025 Georgia Reads Award winner.
- The series spotlights communities creating measurable literacy impact through collaboration.

2. What Literacy Means

Each panelist defines literacy beyond reading and writing:

- Laurie Cook: Literacy equals *opportunity and freedom*—the bridge between poverty and potential.
- **Dr. Alexander:** Literacy is a *window and door to the world*, expanding empathy, imagination, and life chances.
- **Dr. Shields:** Literacy builds *confidence, communication, and critical thinking*—the foundation for future success.



• **Malcolm Mitchell:** Adds that *cultural connection* and motivation are key to literacy engagement.

3. Core Barriers to Literacy

Panelists identify systemic and community challenges:

- **Home & Parent Engagement:** Reading must start at home; parents are a child's *first teacher*.
- Access & Exposure: Students need books and reading opportunities in schools, homes, and public spaces.
- **Teacher Shortages & Training:** Many new educators lack foundational reading instruction skills.
- **Poverty & Family Stress:** Socioeconomic pressures and trauma affect attendance, focus, and parental involvement.
- Technology Distraction: Screens replace reading and interpersonal development.
- Attendance Crisis: Chronic absenteeism directly harms reading progress.

4. Collaborative Solutions

RISE Augusta's model focuses on shared responsibility and sustained partnership:

- **Community Foundation of CSRA** united schools, nonprofits, and businesses around literacy as a "big-picture" goal.
- Partnerships provide tutoring, wraparound supports, and consistent funding with data accountability.
- **Churches, hospitals, and businesses** have joined literacy initiatives like "Read-to-Me" programs for new parents.
- RESA's Role: Acts as a hub connecting districts, training educators, and aligning resources.
- **Schools:** Build trust with community partners by being transparent about student needs (e.g., hunger, clothing, emotional health).

5. Impact and Lessons

- Collaboration changes both student outcomes and school culture.
- Transparency builds credibility and long-term investment.
- Integrating literacy into *every* organizational mission—education, business, or civic—creates sustainability.
- Literacy initiatives succeed when communities see them as *shared work*.



6. Closing Messages

Each panelist offers a takeaway:

- Dr. Shields: "Literacy is everyone's responsibility."
- **Dr. Alexander:** "Embed literacy into every plan, budget, and goal—it must outlast any one program or leader."
- Laurie Cook: "This isn't just an education issue. The entire community must invest in literacy to ensure opportunity for all."
- **Malcolm Mitchell:** "Reading success is a marathon. Progress requires time, consistency, and collaboration."

Tone & Takeaway

This webinar showcases RISE Augusta as a *model for collective literacy leadership*. The conversation underscores that improving literacy isn't a school problem—it's a **community movement** that thrives on shared purpose, transparency, and long-term commitment.
